We hope that through shared study and experience,
all of us are able to continue to become:

- 1) Jews who affirm their Jewish identity and bind themselves inseparably to their people by word and deed.
- 2) Jews who bear witness to the *brit* (the covenant between God and the Jewish people) through the practice of *mitzvot* (commandments) as studied in Torah and the classic Jewish literature it has generated, and interpreted in light of historic development and contemporary liberal thought.
- 3) Jews who affirm their historic bond to *Eretz Yisrael*, the Land of Israel.
- 4) Jews who cherish and study Hebrew, the language of the Jewish People.
- 5) Jews who value and practice *tefilah* (prayer).
- 6) Jews who further the causes of justice, freedom and peace by pursuing *tzedeck* (righteousness), *mishpat* (judgment), and *chesed* (loving deeds).
- 7) Jews who celebrate Shabbat and the festivals and observe the Jewish ceremonies marking the significant occasions in their lives.
- 8) Jews who esteem their own person and the person of others; their family and the family of others; their own community and the community of others.
- 9) Jews who express kinship with *K'lal Yisrael* by actively seeking the welfare of Jews throughout the world.
- 10) Jews who support and participate in the life of the synagogue.

We work towards helping each individual develop these key aspects of a Jewish Identity through a series of programs designed for youth, for adults, and for entire families experiencing the richness of our Jewish heritage together.

Integrating Shabbat Into Your Life...

The most fundamental experience for Jewish communities has always been Shabbat. The rhythm of Shabbat is the heartbeat of the Jewish people, anchoring our every week. Guarding sacred times with our families is central to our Jewish tradition. Especially in our community where the work ethic is so strong, the need for a Shabbat of rest and family time becomes all the more important.

Shabbat is for everyone. In our community we begin at home, when we share sacred time together around our version of the ancient altar: the family table. Following the meal, we travel together to services. In our services we reach out together for the faith to repair our world and learn of our tradition. When our children leave the sanctuary during the sermon, it is for a linked activity; we learn the same lessons so we can discuss them with each other.
